Welcome to our final newsletter for this academic year and what a year it has been!

It has been wonderful to see so many of you back in school attending school events. It finally feels like we have been able to resurrect school activities that happened pre-pandemic and we hope to continue to build on this during the next academic year.

Despite the challenges the year has brought we have not let this stop us from moving forwards to ensure we continue to provide your children with the best education possible, and as we approach the end of term we have been reflecting on what we provide and considering how we can make it even better. As part of this process we have been reviewing feedback from parents, carers, pupils and staff in order to incorporate 'Even Better ifs' into our planning

A powerful piece of feedback came from a group of pupils in school who are wheelchair users, these pupils made a video to highlight accessibility issues and presented their findings to Governors and Buckinghamshire Council. This has resulted in the Council providing funding to make adaptations that will take place over the Summer Holidays.

Last term parents and carers completed the Ofsted questionnaire. The responses to the questionnaire were overwhelmingly positive

98% of parents and carers saying they would recommend the school

97% stated their child felt safe at school

96% stated their child is happy at school

96% stating the school gives their child the support they need to succeed

94% stating that their child is well supported to use strategies to overcome barriers to learning and to regulate their own emotions

We have however identified that we need to improve the following

How we communicate policies and procedures in a simplified way. Although all of these are on our website they can be quite lengthy documents. Our two parent Governors, Louise Gregory and Elton Norris are going to work with us next term to look at how we can produce more streamlined documents

The range of clubs and activities children and young people can take part in. - We are continuing to work with Matt Ogle from S4A to develop this further. In part transport after school continues to be the barrier to pupils being able to attend clubs.

I would like to thank you all for your feedback and support this year. Working in partnership is vital if we are to secure the best outcomes possible for your children.

News from Primary









Coronation Celebrations!

Primary groups Hazel, Oak and Willow celebrated the Coronation of the new King, Charles III, with a traditional 'street party', held in the corridor due to the 'traditionally' British weather.

The pupils looked 'fit for a king' wearing their cloaks, crowns, waving their flags, and sitting on the castle and throne, specially designed by Hazel pupil, Jude.

Development Projects

Our two new buildings in Primary are currently behind schedule but they will be ready to move into in September 2023, allowing us to regain the specialist spaces currently being used as classrooms. The existing spaces will be put back to a sensory space and life skills room.

Pupils joining Willow Class in September visited their new classroom recently and they are looking forward to moving in.



The contractors will be busy over the summer finishing off the buildings, the surrounding ground and reinstating the forest school area. In our existing Cedar classroom, toilet modifications are being made to add a mechanical changing bed and hoist.



We are also anticipating the installation of specialist therapeutic sensory equipment in the early years playground. A new round swing, in ground trampoline and inclusive scooter roundabout are also being installed.

This new equipment has been partially funded by a successful bid to the William Harding Charity. We will continue with fundraising and bids for grants to further improve facilities and access across the school.

Poppy & Laura, pupils who have struggled with the accessibility of our site this year, recently put together a film demonstrating their difficulties. They presented the film to our governors, and in turn this was shared with the Local Authority. The film influenced their decision to fund some modifications on our lower ground floor. GREAT NEWS, and thank you, Poppy and Laura.

An acoustic wall divider is being installed to split one large room into two more useable classrooms, along with the installation of an accessible toilet with bed and hoist. Push pads and automatic arms are being added to six of our existing doors to allow pupils to move around the site more easily on their own.

We are also looking in to the possibility of an external stair riser lift.

Recycling News from Hazel

Hazel class have been learning all about recycling and how we can look after the environment. You may have seen pupils walking around the school grounds, litter picking and making sure the site is pristine. In our classroom we have created various recycling bins, that can be used to sort the waste items we find.

morning in June.








































News from Across Secondary

In September 2021 we embarked on a large outdoor project at Furze Down 'The Big Picture', which focuses on outdoor development of our 8-acre site by improving: site accessibility (wheelchair access), planting, resources, inclusion and biodiversity.



Previous fundraising campaigns have largely been directed to support capital project delivery, internal resourcing, and specific, single items of equipment and now is the time to build upon our success and expand our capabilities and facilities for both the present and the future needs of our pupils.

Our main aim is to ensure that our outdoor environments are fully inclusive and provide all our learners, whether ambulant or non-ambulant, with sensory stimulus, a rich provision of opportunities to develop self-esteem and confidence, while also developing the skills to adapt to a range of new challenges. Our intention is not just to improve our grounds, biodiversity and accessibility, but to design engaging spaces that reflect the values and ethos of our school.

Key areas across our site require tidying and are being improved through planned clearance and planting of appropriate, flowers, shrubs and trees. We also have an extensive perimeter where we have introduced additional planting as it backs on to a new housing development. This has ensured that we have improved our screening and as it establishes, will provide providing shelter, roosting, nesting







Our Two Forest Schools, which are located at the perimeter of the site, in the Primary and Secondary phases, provide a natural outdoor learning experience for our pupils and will be further developed.



Our existing school pond, and the swale area, provide opportunities to attract wildlife, and support activities such as pond dipping. At present these require design and planting improvement, sensitively, considering, the flora and fauna

we have already identified in these areas, alongside improvements in accessibility.



We have already developed a sensory/reflection garden in Primary. This is designed to provide a therapeutic landscape, designed to stimulate the senses, and includes planting which focuses on the 5 senses: touch, smell, sight, taste, and

hearing.

Promoting biodiversity is providing our students with educational, hands-on opportunities to make positive environmental impacts.

Hanging birdhouses, planting wildflower gardens, and expanding recycling programs will

benefit our school's local ecosystem.

Embarking upon this ambitious journey, we have already made strong links with a wealth of expertise from Buckinghamshire including: ecologists,

lepidopterists, pond experts, ornithologists, and like-minded nature enthusiasts.

What Grants/Donations have we received this academic year?

- November 2022- A group of Volunteers from Stowe National Trust joined us to re-site some
 of the existing shrubbery, and planted hornbeam hedging to improve our screening on the
 perimeter of the Primary Playground and along the northern perimeter. The saplings were
 purchased as a result of 2 successful grant applications to both the Buckinghamshire
 Community Board and The Tree Council resulting in awards of both £730.80 and £2,000
- November 2022 Winslow Show Association donation £100
- February 2023 The Lions Club of Winslow 10K Run donation of £500
- Refreshments 10K run £155.75
- March, 2023, we were awarded £15,000, following a successful bid submission to the Winslow and Villages Community Board. This will be used to redevelop our existing Pond Area in the Autumn Term.
- March, 2023, Great Horwood Silver Band donated £200 following their event held at the school
- May 2023, a successful bid application to the William Harding Charity, with an award of £14,338 towards outdoor play equipment for Primary
- £100 private donation towards the ground's development project

Information from Tara and the Catering Team

We cook and serve over 100 lunches per day which are cooked to order with those that you place on Parent Pay.

As you may or may not be aware there is a cut off point for placing orders, this allows us to purchase the ingredients and plan ahead, orders must be placed at least 8 days in advance.

If you do miss this cut off point please ensure that you send your child in with a packed lunch for those days as we have already purchased and planned for our lunches.

You are able to order 1 week at a time or for the whole term, meals booked are paid for at the time of booking.

We have made a few changes to our menu because we have noticed a decline in numbers for a few of our options. The new menu will be available for you to look at and book for September from Friday 21st of June.
