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# Furze Down School News

#### **Dear Parents and Carers**

The Autumn Term is always a busy one, it is also a time of transition and change as pupils adjust to being in new classes. We now have 210 pupils on roll and 147 staff are employed to meet the needs of our children and young people. This is in stark contrast to when I took over the headship in 2015. At this time there were only 112 pupils on roll and 60 staff. This rapid growth has been due to the demand for Special School places across the Country. We are excited that the 2nd stage of the consultation to have a second base in Buckingham has now been completed and we expect to hear the outcome of this in the New Year. The proposal for sixth Form to use the Opportunity Centre in Buckingham will extend the vocational, volunteering and preparation for adulthood activities that are available to them.

Despite the challenges illness and recruitment have brought this term, colleagues have continued to work tirelessly. No matter what challenges have been put their way, or issues they have faced, they have risen to them and worked exceptionally hard to ensure your children are kept safe and above all, that their education has continued. They have been truly remarkable and I am very lucky to lead a team of highly dedicated and professional staff.

After six years as our Chair of Governors Sheree Howard has stepped down from this role, she will however continue as a Governor. On behalf of staff, pupils and parents, I would like to thank Sheree for all her support and hard work over the last 10 years. Our new Chair of Governors is Matthew Watkins, who was previously a Furze Down Parent and also was Chair of Governors at The Buckingham School. Mathew will supported by Elton Norris as the Vice Chair. Elton is a parent Governor. The Governor role is an important one as the job of the Governing Board is to help set the strategic direction of the school and ensure strategic priorities align with our vision and values. We are very lucky to have a team of very dedicated Governors. Matthew and Elton are looking forward to engaging with Parents and Carers in the new Year in order to capture your voice in relation to school priorities and next steps for the school.

### Our current strategic focus has been on the following areas:

- 1. Further developing support for Emotional Health and Wellbeing (EHWB)—We are continuing to collaborate with Dr Amelia Roberts, Deputy Director at UCL's Centre for Inclusive Education. Working with the EHWB Team we have produced a Charter to support pupils Emotional Health and Wellbeing and this academic year the charter and resources are being be rolled out and evaluated. We will share more about this project as it develops
- 2. **Learning to Read and Reading to Learn—**Our work linked to reading continues to be supported by Dr Paula Williams who has carried out extensive research into what works best to support children and young people to learn to read as well as read for meaning. <a href="https://www.psychology4learning.com/educational">https://www.psychology4learning.com/educational</a> psychologists/
- 3. **Maths Mastery-** Centre Teams have been engaging in Teaching for Maths Mastery learning in collaboration with the Maths Enigma Hub <a href="https://enigmamathshub.co.uk/">https://enigmamathshub.co.uk/</a>
- 4. Reviewing and revising our curriculum to ensure it meets the ever-changing needs of our pupils.

The last two weeks have seen us come together as a community as part of our annual carol concerts and nativity. It has been fantastic to see so many of you in school. These events culminated in the highlight of the year our Christmas Bazaar. At the time of writing this I do not yet know the total amount of money raised but I do know the raffle raised over £1700. A big thank you to Diana Campbell one of our new governors who liaised with local businesses encouraging them to donate to Furze Down School, and to all our enterprising pupils and staff.

We look forward to seeing all your children back in school on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> January. Wishing you all a very merry Christmas and looking forward to all that 2024 brings.






### Comic Masterclass

Pupils in year 8 and 9 really enjoyed the wonderful **Kev F Sutherland's Comic Masterclass.** The workshop was linked to the Autumn term 2 unit of work on Superheroes and Comics. Kev F has been writing and drawing comics for everyone from Beano to Marvel, Doctor Who to Viz, Red Dwarf and The Dandy.

The pupils explored how to make comic strips and manga and by the end of a session the group had produced a comic containing a strip by every single one of them, a copy of which they took home, along with a hand drawn caricature of themselves.





### **News from Year 9**

During the Autumn term Year 9 students have enjoyed developing their travel training skills.

They discussed and then practiced elements around road safety including walking along the path, leaving room for other pedestrians and using safe strategies when crossing different roads. Skills included looking



and listening carefully before, and whilst, walking across a road. As well as walking around Winslow the two Year 9 classes have recently explored how to travel safely in the minibus. By considering these new skills they were able to travel to other local villages and towns in order to apply their road safety knowledge in different settings.

Year 9 are great scientists.

During the first half of the Autumn Term, we explored properties of materials. Through practical activities we recapped and extended our knowledge of the properties of different types of materials. We then worked together to carry out a range of experiments to compare and contrast mixtures and solutions, including exploring reversible and irreversible changes in different materials.





The second half of the Autumn Term Year 9 studied sound in their science lessons. We enjoyed lots of investigations, developing a range of scientific skills, whilst finding out about sound.

We discovered that sound is made by vibrations and can travel through different materials, including solids, liquids and gases. Through practical work we have also identified how the pitch of sound can be altered.

# **Employment and Enterprise**

In Employment the Year 9 classes have been working through a variety of tasks to help them identify their strengths and qualities. These have included whether they can listen, follow instructions, and if they work better in a team or on their own.

In Enterprise the skills were taken further by having a goal—making something for the Christmas Fayre.





A range of items were made for the fayre and the stall was wonderfully looked after by several of the Year 9 staff and students. We had items made by the current classes as well as by those who were in Year 9 last year. I am delighted to say that our stall raised just under £50.

The items on offer showed how talented everyone could be when crafting. We will continue some of the skills involved, next term, by looking at how these talents can help you in a real world applications or occupations.

### Remembrance 11.11.11.

The whole school observed a 2 minute silence at 11am on 11th November, 2023.

Miss Cotterill played the last post and pupils and staff stood in perfect silence, together, around the amphitheatre. In reflecting on our observance of the 2 minutes most people

shared that it was very moving and thought provoking.







This half term we were very excited to be invited to take part in a project, funded by Heart of Bucks and a Kop Hill Climb Grant, with the National Paralympic Heritage Trust (NPHT), based at Stoke Mandeville Stadium, the home of the Paralympic Games.

Together, we explored how museums can create genuinely accessible spaces for visitors who may find them challenging places to engage in. This includes how an exploration of the ways movement supports learning.

The holistic approach to rehabilitation adopted by Professor Sir Ludwig Guttmann, the father of the Paralympic Games, saw the introduction of physical movement to the treatment of injured service men and women during the second world war. The effect this had not only on the bodily health of the patients but also on their desire to engage in wider society, fits well with the important work taking place in our schools around sensory circuits and sensory learning.

Together we were able to explore this subject with experts in a variety of fields, learning through the themes presented by the Paralympic Games, exploring opportunities to embed the learning through physically engaging activities.

Using performance, story writing and mindful movements, the project has built on the knowledge and practice already expertly provided at the school, drawing on sensory circuits for inspiration.

Through a process of reflective assessment undertaken at the Trust, we contributed to the exploration of how museums can discreetly support visitors to regulate and engage when enjoying a day out with their families.

The participation of Willow Class and also Year 7 on this project has been instrumental in the creation of resources by the Trust designed to support schools and families when visiting the Heritage Centre. The Trust are now keen for families to test these resources for free.

As the voice of experience, your involvement in this project is actively encouraged and the NPHT would like to invite you and your family to visit the Heritage Centre to test out the new resources and contribute to an informal conversation sharing your aspirations and knowledge around family days out to our local spaces.

## **News from Preparing For Adulthood**




